

Following her death, her longtime servant "Que" returned to his home in China. An article originally published on March 25, 1932 in the Pacific Grove Tribune reports:

*"Lew Kew Sails For Homeland*

*Lew Kew, aged Pacific Grove Chinese, will live out his years in his homeland. For fifty years, Lew Kew was a familiar figure in Pacific Grove. During most of that period he was in the employ of the late Mrs. Emily Fish, famous as the woman light-keeper of Point Pinos. When Mrs. Fish retired and moved to her home at 691 Sinex, Lew Kew went along as a matter of course.*

*Though he was getting near the end of the trail and, like all of his race, desired to end his days in China, Lew Kew refused to leave as long as Mrs. Fish was alive. Soon after her death last June, he commenced preparations for the journey to the land of his ancestors. Tomorrow he leaves Pacific Grove for Oakland, where he will embark for the orient. Lew Kew has a host of friends and acquaintances on the peninsula who wish him a safe journey to his homeland and peaceful days for the evening of his life."*
